Barack Obama, 44th U.S. President

Barack Obama was the first African-American president of the United States. He was elected in 2008. He spent some of his childhood in Indonesia. Then he went to school in Hawaii.

Obama studied law. While he was a student, he was chosen to be the president of the *Harvard Law Review*. It was a great honor. He was the first African American to hold this position.

He worked as a lawyer. But he wanted to help the poor. So, he decided to go into politics. He thought that this would help him make the most impact. He was elected as an Illinois state senator. He worked in that role for eight years. At the

same time, he taught law part-time at a college.

Next, Obama ran for a seat in the U.S. Senate. He won. He became a U.S. senator in 2005. But he did not serve his whole four-year term. Just two years later, he ran for president. He had to step down as senator to be the U.S. president.

Obama won the Nobel Peace Prize in 2009. This prize is given each year. It goes to a person who works for peace. He gave the \$1.4 million prize to ten charities.

They were there to watch the inauguration of the first African American president of the United States. Cheers went up from the crowd after Barack Obama put his hand on the Bible and was sworn in as the 44th president.

When he was a child, few would have guessed that Obama would one day be the president of the most powerful nation in the world. His parents had met and married while in college. His mother, Ann Dunham, was from Kansas. His father, also named Barack Obama, was from Kenya. Their marriage did not last long, and the elder Obama returned to Africa. Obama only met him once when he was ten years old. Ann married a man from Indonesia and took her young son to live there. Obama lived and attended school in Indonesia for several years. Then, his mother's second marriage fell apart.

Obama grew up in Hawaii. He attended a private school and got an excellent education. When he was old enough, he went to college. After he graduated, he worked as a community organizer. A community organizer is someone who gets people together to discuss problems and potential solutions. Once the people have formed a group, the organizer finds the right person(s) in the government to address the group's **grievances**. Obama worked in Chicago, Illinois. He had some minor successes. Even so, he felt like he wasn't making enough of an impact in the lives of the poor. He believed that being in politics would enable him to make the reforms he longed to see happen. So he left his job. He went to Harvard University to earn a law degree.

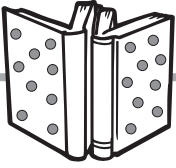
